# He Has Done All Things Well: He Heals Our Deaf and Dumb

#### "The Lord be with you".

Dear People of God, we celebrate today the Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B. The readings for today serve to encourage and give us hope that the advent of the age of salvation is upon us: the deaf hear, the blind see, and those bowed down are raised up. God's Kingdom is made manifest and visible around the Eucharistic Table, where rich and poor alike are invited to feast.

Today's delightful passage from Isaiah expresses confidence in God's gracious efforts to bring the people of Israel back from exile. As in the Exodus, God leads them, and all kinds of evil fall away. Not only is moral evil overcome, but physical suffering is alleviated, and burned, desolate land is regenerated by the presence of God. The prophet Isaiah uses the image of the deaf person to show us what God would one day do for His people. The Israelites had shut their ears and no longer listened to the Lord. We like them are equally deaf to each other. But one day God was to cure their deafness. The signs of that day will be when the deaf hear, the lame walk, the blind see; when we care about them and no longer push them to the edges of society.

The Epistle of James offers a vivid example of what might be called a "preferential option for the rich" - the habit of favouring the wealthy over the poor. The author fiercely criticizes this preference in the forms of discrimination, favouritism or prejudice as a "corrupt" judgment that contrasts sharply with God's own judgment. He points out that the gift of faith - the greatest "wealth" one can possess - has been given also to the poor, thereby signalling God's favour toward them. God's action, therefore, invites us to see things differently and live by a new scale of values. In the light of the Gospel, fine clothes, jewelry, and other material possessions no longer define who is important or who is to receive special privileges. We all need the gift of sight, of hearing and of speech to see, hear and speak as God does, else will be deceived by image-makers. Every individual, though not as physically attractive as others may be, has a value, worth in God's sight, and is deeply loved by Christ.

St Mark, in the Gospel, uses the image of deaf and impeded speech to connect the healing Jesus brings with the divine salvation promised in the Isaiah reading. The episode related to takes place in a Gentile territory. The healing story, unique to Mark, is told in a typical structure: illness described; action of Jesus; and complete cure. Jesus takes the deaf man and impeded in speech aside to perform this healing, and afterwards tells him to keep it secret. His action is highly physical: He sticks his fingers into the man's ears; spits and touches his tongue; looking up to heaven He emits a groan; and says to the man Ephphatha (Be opened). Despites its mysterious elements, the healing is not magic but a miracle pointing to the Reign of God breaking upon humankind. The man could not have been born deaf, for he knows language and speaks immediately upon being healed. He was probably stricken with an illness that deprived him of hearing and impeded his speech. The early Church, seeing in this story a paradigm for liberation leading to witness, developed a Ritual known as the "Ephphatha Rite", which uses some elements of this story to prepare candidates for Baptism.

The man brought to Jesus was deaf and had an impediment in his speech. It was only when his ears were opened that he began to speak clearly. This reminds us that our ability to speak depends very much on our capacity to hear. Hearing comes before speaking. This is also true in our dealings with others. Our capacity to hear someone is more important than what we speak to him/her or do for him/her. That act of listening can be life-giving in its own right. When people are listened to in a non-judgmental way, they begin to come alive in new ways. Also, in describing the healing, the Gospel is saying that the Messianic Times promised in the first reading have arrived. Ears are now opened, tongues loosened in order to announce the Good News. This is our core mandate!

We take this opportunity to wish ourselves a Happy and Blessed Month of September. To our dear Examination Candidates, be assured of our prayers. Fear not, God is in control. Conduct yourselves well, do your best and God will supply the rest. Victory is assured!

Please, remember to stay well, healthy and safe. Be not afraid to attend Mass. Get vaccinated when you have the opportunity. Continue to wear your nose mask and observe all the safety protocols. Your life is dear to us.


